

Tips to Protect Against Burglaries

- Signage:
 - Make your property appear well-protected
 - o Get a Beware of Dog sign even if you don't have a dog





- Keep valuables out of the primary bedroom or home office. Use the garage, kitchen or other unusual locations.
- Buy a small decoy safe and put some costume jewelry or screws in it.
 Keep it in your primary bedroom.
- Security Systems:
 - o Wired security systems are more reliable than wireless. And jam-proof.
 - Some wireless systems are jam-resistant: https://bit.ly/cr-wireless-jam
 - Make sure your system has glass breakage detection and backup power







- Cameras:
 - o A video doorbell that can call your phone when someone rings
 - o Al cameras alert you to vehicles and people, ignoring animals/wind/insects
 - o Some **outdoor** cameras can turn on switches/lights **inside** the house
- Consider having your alarm system call law enforcement directly.
 (Check with law enforcement and your security company if this is allowed.)
- Install **motion detectors outside** that turn on **lights inside**. This makes it look like someone is home and heard something.
- Gates and fences help but be aware that burglaries have occurred despite them
- A pry-resistant security mailbox keeps mail safe. Cheap ones are easily forced.
- Have a friend set out and put away your bins on waste collection day
- Use the **USPS informed delivery** to keep track of your mail. Use vacation hold and notify law enforcement of extended absences
- Use police/sheriff offer "vacation watch"/"patrol check" service while your traveling
- Join (or start!) your Neighborhood Watch group

General Safety Tips

- Make sure you're signed up for AlertSCC, the County's emergency alert system: https://emergencymanagement.sccgov.org/AlertSCC
- And Nixle, the local city emergency notification system: https://www.everbridge.com/products/nixle/
- Make an emergency supply kit (or buy one)
- Use freeze dried foods for long shelf life
- Store water for at least 5 days (refresh every 6 months)
- Keep a spare pair of glasses and prescription medications in your emergency kit

- Keep local law enforcement numbers in your phone for when traveling:

- Install an earthquake gas shutoff valve and/or an excess flow gas valve
- Keep emergency supplies in your home as well a smaller kit in each vehicle
- Keep some cash in case credit card systems are down
- Canned fuel lasts several years. Keep some canned ethanol-free 4-cycle engine fuel on hand for gasoline cars. Also canned 2-cycle fuel for any gasoline generators.
- Know your neighbors and have their contact information on hand
- Have a designated out of state contact in case your family gets separated
- Make a video of your belongings for insurance (use the NAIC Home Inventory App)
